Vaccinations and Parasite Prevention

What are Vaccines?

The vaccines we give your pet are similar to those you would get yourself, just for different viruses. These vaccines contain killed or altered microorganisms, and when injected subcutaneously, the animals immune systems learn how to fight/recognize the virus. If your pet is exposed to the virus after being vaccinated, their immune system will be stimulated, and your pet will either not get sick, or experience less severe symptoms.

Vaccinations and Parasite Prevention

What to expect in your pets first year

For puppies and kittens, as to not overwhelm their immune systems, we break up their vaccinations into boosters, each dose given 3-4 weeks apart.


